I Spy a Word...



- Pick a word and give hints: Choose words that are important to the overall meaning of the text or words that your child struggled to read.
- 2. Invite child to point and read it: Your child should skim the page to find the word. For longer books, tell them which paragraph it's in.
- 3. **Switch:** Now let your child pick a word.
- 4. **Repeat:** For younger children, only talk about 2 or 3 words.

Why this tip?

It's easier to read tricky words when we know a lot of words. We call all the words your child knows their *vocabulary*. A great way to build your child's vocabulary is to spend time talking about words.

Playfully Practice

Instead of giving verbal clues, give nonverbal clues. Draw a quick sketch or act something out so that your child can guess the word you're thinking of.

Next, talk about the word. What does it start with? What does it mean? What tricky sounds does it have?

Then, switch.

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
